



Spotlight: Winter Storm Impacts



Ongoing Monitored Situations

Avian Influenza A(H5N1)

- Louisiana reports nation's first H5N1-death. The <u>patient</u> was over 65 and had underlying medical conditions. The CDC <u>confirmed</u> the virus was of the D1.1 genotype, and not the B3.13 genotype circulating in dairy cattle. The threat to the general public is still considered 'low'.
- HHS awards \$306 million for preparedness. The <u>funds</u> will augment surveillance and training programs, support hospital readiness efforts, and fund the development of countermeasures.
- Fifteen <u>more</u> states join USDA milk <u>testing</u> efforts. This brings the total to 28 states, which collectively represent about two-thirds of the nation's dairy production. Virginia is provisionally <u>unaffected</u> and has not yet started surveillance.
- More raw pet food recalled in California. A
 recall has been <u>issued</u> for Monarch Raw Pet Food
 products sold in local farmer's markets. The food
 infected five cats, two of which have since died.

Mpox

- Clade Ib mpox detected in <u>China</u> and <u>France</u>.
 Both had a history of travel to Africa, though the French case did not report close contact with persons from the region. Four close contacts of the Hong Kong case were also diagnosed with mpox.
- Clade I cases detected in Pakistan and Oman.
 Neither <u>case</u> had traveled to Africa, but both had <u>traveled</u> through the United Arab Emirates. The UAE itself has not reported clade I mpox cases, but India <u>reported</u> a case with a similar travel history in September.

Seasonal Illness


- Flu activity is elevated but stable in Virginia. About 4.3% of emergency department (ED) visits resulted in a diagnosis of flu this week. Though still highly elevated, diagnoses may have plateaued and are up only 0.1 points from last week. Children continue to make up the highest proportion of flu diagnoses.
- COVID-19 growth is slowing. Though the ED diagnosis rate <u>increased</u> to 1.6%, <u>models</u> suggest a decline in activity in the near future. Adults over 65 make up the largest proportion of ED visits.
- RSV activity is stable in Virginia. Though RSV test <u>positivity</u> in HHS Region 3 continues to surge, ED <u>diagnoses</u> in Virginia are down slightly this week. Children under five years of age represent the majority of all RSV diagnoses, but overall activity in that age group is down from late Dec.


Winter Storm Impacts

- Winter Storm <u>Blair</u> caused national impacts this week, spawning 2025's <u>first</u> tornado in California and closing schools across the mid-Atlantic. In addition to ice and snow, the storm spawned 12 tornados. At least 60 <u>million</u> people were under winter weather alerts.
- The Governor's Office declared a State of Emergency ahead of the storm. The storm dropped heavy snow across much of Virginia, including over 10 inches in parts of Northern Virginia. Over 120,000 customers in Virginia were without power at its peak. Virginia state police responded to over 860 vehicle accidents between Sunday and Tuesday. Reagan International Airport shutdown its runways overnight Monday.
- A storm-related power outage brought Richmond's <u>water treatment</u> plant offline Monday, causing low or no pressure throughout the city. The water shortage cascaded to connected counties, affecting Henrico, Hanover and Goochland, though to a lesser extent. Richmond's system was fully pressurized as of Thursday afternoon, but boil water <u>advisories</u> persist.

Other News

- The International Longshoremen's Association came to a tentative <u>agreement</u> with the U.S. Maritime Alliance on a six-year contract. The tentative agreement has avoided a potential strike one week ahead of the January 15 deadline.
- The WHO considers China's hMPV rise routine. Human Metapneumovirus (hMPV) is a well-known respiratory pathogen that usually <u>causes</u> mild illness. Though hMPV activity is increasing in Northern China, WHO <u>considers</u> this rise to be within the "expected range" for the pathogen.
- <u>Wildfires</u> in Los Angeles have forced over 360,000 residents to evacuate and left at least ten dead. While powerful Santa Ana <u>winds</u> coming from the more inland areas of the state are primarily driving the fires, recent drought conditions have made vegetation more <u>flammable</u>.
- A coal train <u>derailed</u> in Fluvanna County on Tuesday morning, leaving multiple loaded coal cars overturned. No injuries were reported and there are no environmental concerns at this time, but the cause of the incident remains under investigation.

The largest fires, the Palisades Fire and Eaton Fire, are blazing over 33,000 acres combined, and were completely uncontained as of Wednesday evening.
